

Dear Sir:

I herein submit to you the Annual Report of the Lorain Police Department for the year 2013. Included you will find reports from the various operational and administrative units, along with statistical data on crime, police activity, training, and special operations.

The emphasis during 2013 was to continue the transition to Intelligence-led policing; this is a model and philosophy that uses data analysis and criminal intelligence during decision-making to facilitate a decrease in violence, crime, and quality of life issues faced by the community. By identifying when and where crimes are being committed, and by whom, and targeting serial and serious offenders, it allows us to interpret the criminal environment in a way that will have an impact on crime solving and reduction.

In addition, we implemented our CrimeStat program in 2013. Every Monday morning the Crime Analysis Unit distributes a report on crimes reported for the previous week (by day, time, and location), along with enforcement activity by the different Patrol Operations teams. Bi-weekly CrimeStat meetings are held, with every Captain, Lieutenant, and unit commander present (and the Chief of Police facilitating); during CrimeStat the data is studied and analyzed together and then action plans are developed to address the various issues. Each supervisor makes a presentation to share what responses his/her units have taken to address specific problems, locations, or individuals. Officers are given discretion and encouraged to be creative and collaborative in coming up with solutions.

Uniform Crime Reports (UCR) statistics indicate an overall reduction of 11% in crime for the City of Lorain. We also observed a shift from the high number of shootings that we dealt with in earlier years to more of an emphasis on property crimes. To some degree we must credit the new approach and change in philosophy within the Police Department, and the support that we have enjoyed from our officers in the field, our administrative and support staff, and the comprehensive strategy adopted by the City Administration and City Council...the hiring of six new police officers and two additional dispatchers; addressing the abandoned housing issues; the rejection of liquor license renewals for problem bars; and the passing of false alarm and nuisance ordinances.

Other significant accomplishments during 2013 include:

- The expansion and improvement of the Department Training Program, under the leadership of Officer Juan Rodriguez, Sergeant Larry Meek, and Lieutenant Ed Super. Each officer within the LPD received 90 hours of in-service training; this is 50 hours above the accepted 40 hours recommended for law enforcement agencies in Ohio (and 10 times more than the mandated amount). In addition, this was supplemented by Roll Call training, on-line access to classes, and specialized off-site training for those assigned to investigative and special operations units.
- Patrol Operations worked in collaboration with the Lorain City Schools to update their emergency response plans for each building. This was to align plans with changing philosophy as to how certain situations should be handled.
- The Lorain Police Department held our very first annual Awards & Recognition Banquet at DeLuca's Place in the Park. Dozens of officers and civilian staff received medals, ribbons, and certificates for acts of valor, life-saving achievements, and meritorious actions for the past 20 years. The mayor and his staff attended and our officers were extremely proud and grateful for the much belated recognition. All awards were posted on the Lorain Police Department website to share these wonderful accomplishments with our community.
- In June, 2012 the Lorain Police Department hosted a meeting to discuss the growing epidemic of heroin-related deaths in Lorain County. We suggested following the path of the Quincy, Massachusetts Police Department to equip first responders with Naloxone (Narcan); Naloxone is a drug used to counter the effects of an opioid overdose. Lorain County Coroner Stephen Evans was familiar with Narcan and agreed to write the prescription for Lorain Police Officers to carry it. However, he ran into resistance from the Ohio Pharmacy Board and learned that apparently this would be in conflict with state law. We contacted State Senator Gayle Manning and asked for her assistance.

Through her efforts, and in collaboration with Dr. Evans and the Lorain County ADAS Board, Ohio passed Senate Bill 57 in 2013; this bill provided for Project DAWN, a one year pilot project for Lorain County only that would allow first responders to carry and utilize Narcan. The Lorain Police Department made the first save in Ohio and by the end of the year had saved 20 of our citizens from certain death. The LPD also assisted in the project by developing a model policy for other law enforcement agencies to use, and developed a training video to expedite the process here in Lorain County. The program was so successful that Ohio passed a law permitting the entire state to participate in the Narcan program (much sooner than the one year deadline).

On behalf of the men and women of the Lorain Police Department I would like to take this opportunity to thank you, the City Administration, Lorain City Council, other City offices and departments, and the citizens of Lorain for their continued support as we work together to make "our" city a decent and safe place to live and conduct business.

The Unit also is able to address specific criminal activity that negatively impacts the quality of life for the citizens of Lorain. Very often, these issues center on the use or sale of illegal drugs.

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

- One suspect, known as the ATV bandit that plagued the City with break-ins and thefts in the first part of the year was identified and apprehended.
- After the New Years Eve homicide which originated with gun violence at the Cotton Club, the CIU worked multiple times with the Ohio Investigative Unit (Liquor Control) to combat problems at nuisance bars, thus resulting in the closing of Biggy's Bar after it was cited for permitting drug abuse.
- The Cotton Club was cited for after hours sales, Mutt & Jeff's, Marathon (25/Broadway) and Jack & Diane's cited for underage sales with use of confidential informants.
- CIU Officers worked in connection with the CID in South Lorain conducting surveillance and making numerous stops due to daytime burglaries. This resulted in the culmination of operation Grinch Grab which resulted in the apprehension of 13 suspects.
- Approximately five weeks were spent approximately on surveillance and aggressive
 enforcement of the West Erie Motels, resulting in numerous arrests and usable
 intelligence. Abatement packets were made in conjunction with Narcotics letters and
 sent to the motels. They have since cleaned up, however, we are still actively monitoring
 them.
- Acting on a tip, the Unit located and arrested an escapee from the Lorain County Jail.
- Two CIU officers, while holding surveillance on intelligence that they had developed in the area of W. 44th St. and Oberlin Avenue. conducted a traffic stop which resulted in the arrest of known drug trafficker Eugene Chaney from Detroit and the confiscation of 127 grams of cocaine and 100 grams of heroin.
- Throughout the course of the year, CIU officers assisted our Narcotics officers, US Marshals, and the CID with a multitude of tasks, including, but not limited to: informant development, surveillance, search warrants/raids, apprehensions and investigations.

The Lorain Police K-9 unit consists of 3 uniformed patrol K-9 handlers assigned to the Patrol Division. K-9's Kriss, Garp and Scotty are dual purpose K-9s and provide support to the patrol teams and assistance to the other department units for critical incidents and callouts. Their duties include deployments for alarms, building searches, article searches, narcotics sniffs, tracking fleeing subjects, and evidence locating abilities.

The K-9's also provide the community with presentations and public appearances throughout the year, promoting their uses and abilities. They also provide support to the government public housing units in the city with narcotics sniffs.

The K-9 teams also provide mutual aid support to the surrounding police agencies and continue to raise public awareness on the effectiveness of a K-9 unit.

Officer Craig Payne and K-9 Kriss received the Valor Award by the North American Police Work Dog Association for his display of bravery in the line of duty during an incident on June 3, 2012.


School Resource Officer (SRO)




The School Resource Officer (SRO) is assigned to Lorain High School to act as a liaison between the Police Department, the students, and the staff. The SRO ensures the safety of students and staff from internal as well as external threats. Due to the SRO's office location in the high school, he is able to respond to problems rapidly when they occur, as well as diffuse situations before they escalate into problematic incidents by providing strategies to resolve conflicts. The SRO handles criminal investigations that occur on campus and also conducts training and informational classes for students and faculty. One of the larger action plans the SRO coordinates every year is the Lorain City School's (LCS) Crisis Response Plan. During 2013 the SRO provided instructional courses at LHS and other community meetings. The SRO attended special events at LHS as well as after school activities. The Lorain Police Department and Lorain City Schools are committed to protecting your children.











TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS









The Traffic Unit handled 34% of all reported crashes and 62% of all available crashes (in accordance with the traffic officer's work schedule).

The Unit investigated 1 fatal crash which resulted in 1 death and 6 serious injury crashes.

Traffic Officers responded to 81 requests for vehicle lockouts in 2013 and also processed 167 junk motor vehicle affidavits. There were no salvage vehicle auctions held this year. The Department impounded 1,544 vehicles during the year.

The Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Unit conducted three days of enforcement actions which resulted in seven commercial vehicles being weighed and removed from service by the Ohio State Highway DOT inspectors. (Four days were cancelled due to training and/or manpower issues.)

Traffic Officer Kyle Gelenius conducted Safety Town from July 8th to August 2nd. A total of 210 children graduated from Safety Town.

In 2013, the Lorain Police Department Traffic Unit was assigned 3 Patrol Officers and one Sergeant.

The Traffic Division's duties consist of the investigation of all fatal and serious traffic crashes within the City of Lorain. The Traffic Division also investigates traffic crashes that occur during their assigned duty hours, conduct hit skip investigations, and enforcement of traffic and motor vehicle laws. Additional duties of the Unit is the processing of all junk and salvaged vehicles within Ernie's American and Fritz's towing companies, all immobilization's and forfeitures of vehicles from the courts, as well as all vehicle auctions resulting from salvage and forfeitures.

The Traffic Unit provided traffic control for all parades, festivals and holidays that were held in the City of Lorain. They also provide funeral escorts as directed by the Chief of Police. They provide both in-service training as well as Police Academy training at Lorain County Community College.

2013 TRAFFIC GRANT:

During 2012 - 2013 fiscal years, our City was once again awarded a grant from the Ohio Department of Public Safety, Governor's Highway Safety Office. This grant is for the specific purpose of providing overtime enforcement of the traffic ordinances of the State of Ohio and / or the ordinance of City of Lorain, with special attention to those violations of Occupant Restraint, Speed, and Driving Under the Influence violation.

ENFORCEMENT BLITZ:

Overtime Enforcement was conducted during pre-determined periods, on the main thorough fares within our City. Officers worked on an overtime basis during specific time periods of the week, this usually ranged from 0700-1100 or 1400-1800. DUI enforcement was held from 2200-0400 hrs.

The 2013 boating season proved to be highly successful for the Lorain Marine Patrol unit on a number of fronts.

Boater Perceptions

A conscious effort was made this season to change the perception of the LMP by following a community policing model in which we reached out to the boating community through an aggressive boater's education program, and making the crew available to the boating public.

This tactic proved highly effective as by the close of the 2013 boating season local boaters seemed much more apt to approach our crew to report suspicious activity on the water, thus promoting a safer waterway.

Working Relationships

In the 2013 season the LMP participated with partner agencies in order to foster more productive working relationships.

This season the crew participated in training exercises/classes with ODNR Watercraft, U.S.C.G. Station Cleveland, and Customs & Boarder Protection in a variety of subjects. The crew also trained on multiple occasions with U.S.C.G. Station Lorain in search and rescue patterns and techniques, as well as towing of disabled vessels.

Inspection Program and Enforcement

The Lorain Marine Patrol's primary mission continues to be safety, and promoting safe recreational use of the City of Lorain's waterfront. With this in mind LMP conducted 464 vessel safety inspections as well as 549 spot checks of boats on the water. These inspections/checks resulted in 272 warnings being issued for violations, most of which stemmed from missing or malfunctioning safety equipment, as well as a handful of citations/arrests for flagrant violations.

Support of Public Events

The Lorain Marine Patrol provided safety support/assistance for numerous public special events to include Port Fest, International Festival, Black River Clean-up, Kayak-a-thon, as well as multiple Triathlons, and Concerts on the water.

Boater assistance / Search and Rescue

During the 2013 boating season the Lorain Marine Patrol assisted 58 vessels and 161 boaters with everything from advice on marine forecasts, to general boater safety advice.

The LMP also responded to 10 search and rescue calls in which 19 persons were saved/removed from danger.

Investigations

The Lorain Marine Patrol conducted 6 boating accident investigations, and assisted the Lorain Police Detective Bureau in an investigation at the Lorain Historical Lighthouse.

LMP also conducted its own investigation into a scuttled vessel/stolen engine and outdrive in coordination with the Lorain Police Detective Bureau.

Accomplishments & Goals

The Lorain Marine Patrol successfully adopted the philosophy of Ohio State House Bill 29 (Boater freedom Act) well before the law went into effect.


The LMP, in cooperation with U.S.C.G. Station Lorain, standardized the wake zones in Lorain Harbor and the Black River ensuring boater awareness, and uniform enforcement.

Future Goals

The Lorain Marine Patrol is prepared to continue forward into the 2014 boating season. New radar/sonar equipment has been acquired in order to better serve the boating public, and provide better support to the Lorain Police Department.

The LMP is addressing a safety issue at Beaver Park Beach during the off season in which personal watercrafts have endangered swimmers by driving into the beach. The LMP is in the process of gaining the necessary permission to install No Wake buoys off the beach in order to create a designated swimming area thus protecting swimmers.

CRISIS NEGOTIATIONS TEAM


The Lorain Police Department Crisis Negotiations Team works with SWAT and other units within the Department to communicate and negotiate with persons in crisis due to hostage situations, suicidal persons, or barricaded persons. The team is lead by a sergeant and several officers who have received specialized training to de-escalate volatile situations for the safety of all.

Members consist of Sergeant Robert Brown, Detective Brian Denman, Patrolman David Kusznir, and Patrolman Jason Orellano.

Incidents Involving Crisis Negotiations Team:

- ➤ 1037 West 22nd Street 2/11/13 Children's Services was at the residence to take custody of two children, and the mother refused to turn them over. After a lengthy negotiation, we were able to resolve the situation without incident. (#13-5831)
- ➤ 1848 East 31st Street and 3237 Charleston Avenue 2/26/13 Assisted SWAT with two raids, 41 guns were recovered. Half of the team assisted at one location, the other half was present at the other location. (12-42297)
- ➤ 256 East Marina Parkway 3/12/13 Patrol officers checking on the welfare of a female received no response. Narcotics secured drug search warrant and entry was made. One male was arrested and the female was found to be safe. (13-9873)
- ➤ 220 West 16th Street 6/20/13 Report of a barricaded male with a female hostage. Were able to determine information provided was not valid. House was searched and checked fine. (13-26283)
- ➤ 1125 West 5th Street 8/27/13 Assisted SWAT with raid. (13-42423)
- ➤ 1228 Root Road 8/28/13 Barricaded male with a gun. Just as we arrived, the male surrendered. (13-39043)
- ➤ East 31st Street near Norfolk Avenue Male threatening to jump off the bridge. Sergeant Brown and Patrolman Orellano were on scene and Detective Denman and Patrolman Kusznir were seconds out, when, just as talks were beginning, the male turned himself over to Patrolman Middlebrooks (the first patrol officer on the scene). - ▶ 1908 West 11th Street 11/22/13 Male barricaded with guns; called in by his son due to the father being off his medication and acting irrationally. As patrol arrived, the wife ran from the home and the male barricaded himself, refusing to give up his weapons. Patrolman Orellano talked with the male for over two hours. The male eventually gave up, without incident. (13-52769) 52

The overall clearance rate was 16.68% higher than in 2012. This, despite the fact that Detective Orlando Perez retired and Det. Dennis Camarillo was promoted out of the unit. The 2013 statistics show substantial increases in clearance rates in all of the UCR categories, and a slight decrease in the clearance rate in only one reported category, non-UCR miscellaneous incidents. While improvements can still be made in the Unit's effectiveness, their efforts during 2013 were commendable.

- Det. Dennis Camarillo was promoted and reassigned to the Patrol Division, with Det.
 Tabitha Angello replacing him. Sgt. Dennis Camarillo performed exceptionally while
 assigned to CID. He is an outstanding Police Officer and his experience will be of value
 while in his current assignment.
- Detectives Brian Denman and Chris Kovach received extensive training to prepare them
 for State certification as Master Evidence Technicians. It had been planned that both
 complete this training by the end of 2013, however due to scheduling issues with
 OPOTA, their final class will be rescheduled for early 2014. After which both will take a
 proficiency examination and become certified.

• There were five homicides in 2013; however, all were cleared through arrest or by some other means (death of the offender).

(The Marquise McCall "cold case" homicide has been presented to the Lorain County Grand Jury, and trial is set for January 2014.)

- Det. Brian Denman and Narcotics Det. Michael Gidich were both assigned to investigate a Public Corruption case involving a Lorain City Clerk of Courts employee. This investigation is on-going.
- Det. Buddy Sivert was promoted to Det. Sgt. and was assigned as the Crimes against Persons supervisor.
- Det. Tabitha Angello has received training in sex crimes investigations and will be dualtasked as both a Property Crimes Detective and a Sexual Assault investigator.

2014:

The up-coming year will provide its challenges. The Department's "calls-for-service" will likely continue to be near 60,000, which will predictably reflect a similar amount of cases assigned to CID as in 2012 and 2013. We will endeavor to produce quality investigations that will assist the Lorain County Prosecutor's Office in their prosecutions. Educationally, the CID members will be assigned training/classes to keep them abreast of emerging trends in criminal investigations and proactive "sweeps" and mass indictments will continue to be used to address "spikes" in crime that are identified through crime analysis.

1/1/13 – Dispute between the shooter and another person that spilled over from the bars in South Lorain. The shooter and the other person had exchanged shots throughout the night, and the victim was accidentally shot to death as the shooter was again trying to shoot the other person. **Solved.** (13-58)

4/21/13 – Estranged wife shot to death by male in a domestic dispute. The male companion of the wife was also killed (see below). The suspect then killed himself. **Solved.** (13-16147)

4/21/13 – Male shot to death by the estranged husband of his female companion in a domestic dispute. The female was also killed (see above). The suspect then killed himself **Solved.** (13-16147)

Male shot to death (Reckless Homicide/Accidental) while the shooter was playing with a gun. The shooter fled the state and was captured in the Carolinas. **Solved**.

8/11/13 – Man stabbed to death by his girlfriend in their home during a domestic dispute. **Solved.** (13-35676)

10/21/13 – Female shot by suspect who then died due to drugs he had ingested. This was a male/female acquaintance homicide. **Solved**

Lorain Police Property & Evidence 2013 Annual Report

- In 2013, the Lorain Police Department Evidence Room was under the full time supervision of Sergeant Mark McCoy. The process of review and disposal of evidence continued in 2013 utilizing Officer Larry Swanger at various times due to his light duty status in addition to Sgt. McCoy being off to receive and recuperate from surgery. Ofc. Swanger split time between the evidence function and radio relief in the Communication Center.
- The installation of Disposal Review dates in 2011 now allows for quick recognition of all evidence items that can be checked for disposal. The schedule for disposal of evidence items is: 3 months for Found Property. 6 months for property involved in a misdemeanor offense and 1 year for property from felony offenses. Reviews of these dates are ongoing thus evidence items can quickly be identified for review and disposed when the case is confirmed to be closed.
- Acrelormittal Steel in Cleveland continued to provide a valuable service of disposing of seized firearms. Drug disposal was again conducted under contract with Ross Environmental utilizing a two-man rule for disposal verification. Noncontraband items, such as clothing were disposed of through Allied Waste. Scrap metals through Lorain County Recycling and paperwork, cassette tapes, and photos were disposed of through Shred It Security Company.
- The Law Directors office was asked to provide a legal opinion regarding disposal Sexual Assault Kits that were found to not to contain any biological evidence, kits where a complaint had not been filed with local authorities or kits from cases where the victim refused to cooperate with the investigation. The opinion rendered is that unless a sexual assault can be determined to have not taken place it should be assumed that there was an offense, thus all Sexual Assault Kits will be submitted for testing at BCI and afforded the protections of Senate Bill 77. Language for a department policy on this matter is being reviewed by the Office of Professional Standards via current policies of other large departments.
- The volume of evidence being collected by Lorain Police Department continues to increase every year. In 2013 the evidence room logged in 6390 in pieces of evidence. A 33% increase over the 4790 items collected in 2012 which was a 56% increase over the 3653 evidence items in 2011
- Lorain Police Department did not hold an auction in 2013. 21 unclaimed bicycles were donated to local youth organizations El Centro, Neighborhood Alliance and Summer Bible Study Group. 10 junk bikes were sold for scrap value to Lorain Metals.

- In 2013, the Evidence Officer submitted 669 pieces of drug evidence to the Lorain County Crime Lab compared to 628 pieces in 2012. This year's number comprised 45% of all drugs submitted to the Lorain County Crime Lab by all county law enforcement agencies (1498). 336 pieces of evidence were submitted to BCI&I for forensic examination in criminal cases. Additional evidence from the CID and the Patrol Basic Evidence Technicians were processed by Sgt. McCoy directly through the LPD & Lorain County Crime Labs.
- During the 2013 year, 3642 evidence items were researched and prepped for disposal via court order. This is compared to 9516 evidence items dispose of in 2012 and 11,251 disposed of in 2011. This is reflective of a shift in the reduction of evidence being stored as a result of a continuous review and purge program that attempts to counteract the increase in evidence being collected on a daily basis and evidence being retained long term as a result of SB77.
- In 2013 117 seized/found firearms were entered into evidence opposed to the 81 entered in 2012. Weapons suitable for testing through the National Integrated Ballistic Identification Network (NIBIN) were test fired and the casings submitted to BCI for entry.
- In 2013 120 weapons were identified and designated for destruction through incineration.
- In 2013 cash seized in 92 cases was deposited into the Lorain Police Evidence Account totaling \$112,385.61.
- In 2013 three checks were issued to the LETF account totaling \$122,735.00 on 22 Lorain Police cases involving seized cash. Funds were forfeited via court order for the police/prosecutor split.
- 194 items entered into the Property and Evidence room were returned to their original owners.
- 65 evidence items were turned over to other agencies. Generally weapons and ammunition turned over to federal agencies (ATF) for prosecution in their court system.
- In 2013 all sexual assault kits were identified and scheduled to be moved to a central location in Evidence Room 2 for long term storage to conform to SB77 requirements.

US MARSHALS NOVFTF-LORAIN DIVISION: YEAR END REPORT 2013

The US Marshals Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force-Lorain Division is comprised of five full time officers and augmented by many part-time officers from various departments throughout Lorain, Erie, and Medina counties. While the area of responsibility for the division is Lorain, Erie and northern Medina counties, the vast majority of our time is spent in the cities of Lorain and Elyria.

For 2013 the task force recorded the following arrests and seizures (statistics are compiled for the federal fiscal year which runs from 10/01/2012 through 09/30/2013):

ARRESTS: -377 physical arrests

-444 warrants cleared

SEIZURES: -1.8 kg narcotics

-\$3,277 currency

-12 firearms

SIGNIFICANT ARRESTS BY "NOFVTF-LORAIN DIVISION" FOR 2013:

<u>Desmond Noble:</u> wanted for the murder committed New Year's day at W 25th St/Broadway Ave. Arrested January 3, 2013 in Elyria.

<u>Anetaeus Spencer:</u> wanted for felonious assault/weapons charges and parole violation for October 2012 shooting at "Gill's Niteclub". Spencer subsequently fled to Alabama and Columbus, OH before eventually being apprehended in Lorain, on August 24, 2013.

<u>Larry Dolin III:</u> wanted for menacing by stalking and failing to register as a sexual offender. Arrested September 2013 in a Cleveland hotel registered in a girlfriend's name. Was actively attempting to elude authorities and flee the area.

<u>Jason O'Neal:</u> wanted for a forcible rape that occurred on W. 2nd St in July 2013. Fugitive was subsequently tracked to a hotel in Elyria (registered under an assumed name) and arrested August 1, 2013 actively preparing to flee the state and return to Tennessee.

<u>Raymond Velazquez:</u> wanted for a robbery/felonious assault that he committed against an exgirlfriend on E. 34th St/Clifton Ave. Fugitive carjacked the victim and effectively abducted her and fled the area. Fugitive was tracked to East Cleveland where he was apprehended with the victim and her child hiding in an attic in July 2013.

These five examples represent a small sample of the arrests made during 2013, as well as taking dangerous felons off the streets, collaterally, over a kilogram of various narcotics were seized, and 12 firearms were removed from criminal's hands.

NARCOTICS AND SPECIAL INVESTIGATIONS BUREAU

The NSI Bureau had a very productive year during 2013. The Bureau was able to self initiate sixty-eight (68) Drug Trafficking investigations resulting in numerous seizures and confiscations. In addition to Narcotics investigations, this Bureau uncovered a theft and tampering with records violation within the Lorain City Clerk of Courts Office. This office worked exclusively for more than a month on this case during which time we uncovered multiple occurrences of theft, fraud, and tampering with records. The extent of the investigation was so large that it was eventually turned into a Federal Task Force in which we are still an active participant.

During the Bureau's self initiated investigations, we conducted one hundred and eight (108) controlled purchases of narcotics. The controlled buys led to thirty-one (31) search warrants and an additional thirteen (13) consensual entries. In addition, we conducted five (5) controlled deliveries with the Federal Postal Inspectors and have been able to utilize several pieces of specialized covert surveillance equipment while keeping overtime to a minimum. Of the sixty-six (66) drug trafficking investigations, thirty-one (31) of them are at a felony level 1 or 2, which requires mandatory prison time, and another fourteen (14) are felony 3, which is a presumption for prison time. Finally, the NSI Bureau successfully completed seven (7) computer forensic examinations and twelve (12) forensic cell phone examinations.

During the month of November 2013, Lorain County saw a huge increase of heroin related overdoses within a five day period. This Bureau along with other county agencies, worked tirelessly for more than two weeks attempting to identify the source of the substance causing all these overdoses. After countless man hours, we were able to identify the cause of the deaths as a pharmaceutical grade of fentanyl being sold on the streets as heroin. As we learned, fentanyl is 100 times more potent than heroin thus causing the large influx of deaths and overdoses. During this two week time period, a total of 14 drug traffickers were arrested.

Although we had a slight decrease in controlled buys compared to 2012 due to a few lengthy investigations, our monetary and firearm seizures were up quite significantly. The NSI Bureau seized in excess of one hundred nineteen thousand dollars (\$119,000) in cash during the year with a large portion coming from a large scale drug trafficker. This investigation led to the trafficker being charged with a Felony 1, Engaging in a Pattern of Corrupt Activity charge. In addition, we concluded an investigation in early February that resulted in the seizure of forty-three (43) handgun and assault rifles and a substantial amount of heroin and cocaine. This case was initiated and developed by the NSI Bureau and we eventually contacted the DEA for assistance on the out of state connection. The subject in this case was prosecuted Federally for the weapons violations and through the State of Ohio for the Drug Trafficking violations.

The NSI Bureau maintained and monitored records for 21 charitable gambling events held within the city of Lorain during 2013. In addition, we worked actively with Sgt. Failing generating information and reports to successfully close two liquor establishments which were creating constant havoc. Finally, after successful approval of the Pilot Project DAWN within the State of Ohio, Detective Gidich became the department trainer and overseer of the drug Narcan being successfully utilized by the men and women of the Lorain Police Department.

The NSI Bureau will continue to aggressively attack the epidemic heroin trade that has plagued this city for the past several years, along with any other drug related crimes that are discovered.

We will continue to work with the Detective Bureau on their major cases and whatever other need is requested by the Command Staff.





In 2013 the SWAT Team was activated for 6 incidents. The incidents consisted of three high risk warrants, and two barricaded gunmen (domestics), and one hostage rescue. SWAT assisted with nine other incidents that did not requuire full SWAT call out.

2013 SWAT YEAR END SUMMARY

During 2013, the Lorain Police SWAT Team was activated on six (6) incidents, and contributed on nine (9) additional incidents. Below is a summary of each call-out;

1. High Risk Warrant Service "No-Knock"

1848 E. 31st St.- On February 26, 2013 the SWAT Team was activated to assist the Narcotics Bureau on a High Risk Search Warrant service at this address. The suspect, Jose "Papacito" Romero was a known high level heroin dealer with a lengthy felony record, including crimes of violence. Romero was also believed to have access to, and was possibly trafficking in firearms. A No-Knock search warrant was applied for and accepted. The team executed the warrant using the side door as the primary point of entry, but when this was found to be blocked, diverted to the secondary point of entry (front door). Since the element of surprise was no longer in our favor a "Breech and Hold, call-out" technique was utilized. Romero was apprehended and three firearms, cash, and marijuana were seized (12-42297)

2. High Risk Warrant Service "No-Knock"

<u>3237 Charleston-</u>- On February 26, 2013 the SWAT Team was activated to assist the Narcotics Bureau on a High Risk Search Warrant service at this address. The suspects, Jose "Papacito" Romero, Luis Acevedo, and Kevin Thorpe were believed to be a part of a high level drug trafficking operation. Members of this drug trafficking organization were convicted violent felons with access to a large amount of firearms. The search warrant was executed and over 35 guns, 3 ounces of heroin, and cash were seized. (12-42297)

3. Possible Barricaded Hostage "Knock and Announce"

256 E. Marina Parkway-- on March 12, 2013 the SWAT team responded to this address in response to a possible Hostage situation. The occupants of the house did not respond to repeated announcements to surrender themselves and a search warrant was secured. During the search warrant John Rebok was arrested, but the female inside was not found to be a hostage. During the search 1,860g of marijuana, cocaine, cash, and a firearm were seized. (12-40926)

4. High Risk Search warrant service "Knock and Announce"

1125 W. 5th St.- On Sept. 27, 2013, the SWAT Team was activated to assist the Narcotics Bureau on a High Risk Search Warrant service at this address. The house was very large and took some time for the 14 SWAT members to secure. The suspect, Victor Brooks, a convicted felon, was located and arrested. Marijuana, crack cocaine, and cash were seized. (13-42423)

5. Barricaded gunman

Root Rd.- On Aug. 28, 2013, the SWAT Team was activated and responded to this address in response to a suicidal/homicidal Persian Gulf veteran who had threatened to shoot family members with one of three guns that he possessed. After deploying SWAT marksmen and seding other team members to relieve inner perimeter units, the suspect surrendered. And was transported to Mercy Regional Medical Facility for evaluation and assistance. Three firearms were seized. When clearing the structure it was discovered that the subject had opened a natural gas line and had greased the floors. (13-39043)

6. Barricaded gunman

<u>W. 11th St.</u>.- On Nov. 22, 2013 the SWAT TEAM was activated and responded to a West 11th Street addres on a Barricaded gunman call. Upon arrival the Hostage Negotiators were also called. The suspect had just released his wife after holding her at gunpoint for three days. Hostage Rescue negotiated with the suspect for four and a half hours before he surrendered to a SWAT arrest team. Three handguns were located and seized. (13-52769)

Additional Services Provided

On nine (9) occasions in 2013 there were additional incidents that did require additional tactical considerations but did not merit a full SWAT deployment. During these nine incidents SWAT Officers contributed by acting as entry team members, assisting both the Patrol Division, and the Narcotics Bureau.

Training

- -Officers John Dougherty and Juan Rodriguez successfully completed Advanced SWAT Training, by North American Swat Training Association, Columbus, Ohio
- -Officers AJ Mathewson and Matt Bonkoski attended the National Tactical Officers Association conference near Toledo, Ohio.

- Chief Cel Rivera approved the acquisition of a Tactical Armored Vehicle, which will be ready for deployments in 2014.
